

ENDING THE HIV EPIDEMIC: A PLAN FOR AMERICA

75% reduction in new HIV infections in 5 years and at least 90% reduction in 10 years.



FY 2020 Ending the HIV Epidemic Awards

Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Ending the HIV Epidemic (EHE) Award

HRSA awarded approximately **\$63 million** to **60 Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program recipients** to link people with HIV who are either newly diagnosed, or are diagnosed but currently not in care, to essential HIV care and treatment and support services, as well as to provide workforce training and technical assistance.

\$55,070,000 to 39 metropolitan areas and eight states

READY What if there were a pill that could help prevent HIV? prevent HIV? PrEP THERE IS.

Pre-exposure prophylaxis (or PrEP) is a way to prevent people who do not have HIV from getting HIV, by taking one pill every day as prescribed.

The initiative's goal is to reduce the number of new HIV infections in the U.S. by:

The Ready, Set, PrEP program makes PrEP medications available at no cost for people who qualify.

HOW CAN I ENROLL IN THE READY, SET. Prep Program?

To receive PrEP medication through the Ready, Set, PrEP program, you must:

- Test negative for HIV
- Have a valid prescription from your healthcare provider
- Not have insurance that covers prescription drugs








Clients receiving RWHAP and Ending the HIV Epidemic Initiative Services, and ART Prescription, March-August 2020


RWHAP EHE-funded providers submitted data to the EHE Triannual Module for the first reporting period [March through August 2020]. These data^a represent clients that received services, of whom nearly 6,300 were new to RWHAP and an additional 3,600 were re-engaged^b in RWHAP services.

PreP Implementation in Health Centers

Additionally, between 2014-2019, health centers increased the number of PrEP providers and patients at a higher rate than other care delivery settings in the EHE priority counties.**

Statement from President-elect Joe Biden on World AIDS Day

Today, Jill and I join with communities around the globe to remember those we have lost and to recommit ourselves to ending AIDS as a public health threat.

COVID-19 is a reminder that we cannot let up in our efforts to fight other epidemics, so many of which - including HIV/AIDS - have been exacerbated by this pandemic. We will pursue bold solutions and increase our collaboration with affected communities around the globe. We will redouble our efforts to tackle health inequities that impact communities of color, LGBTQ+ people, and other marginalized groups, including women and children. We will work with activists and advocates to raise awareness about HIV/AIDS, human rights, and listen to scientists, nurses, and other public health experts who have saved countless lives. We will reinstate the Office of National AIDS Policy, release a new comprehensive National Strategy on HIV/AIDS, and expand support for bipartisan programs like the U.S. President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria. Together, we will change the tide of rising infections, expand treatment, and support health security around the world.

This year, World AIDS Day honors the resilience and impact of advocates, activists, and frontline workers who have spent decades treating people with dignity, fighting for human rights, and saving lives. Because of their work, an AIDS-free generation is not only imaginable, it is within our reach. And under a Biden-Harris Administration, America's response to the HIV/AIDS epidemic in this moment will match their unparalleled example.

VISION

The United States will be a place where new HIV infections are prevented, every person knows their status, and every person with HIV has high-quality care and treatment and lives free from stigma and discrimination.

This vision includes all people, regardless of age, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, religion, disability, geographic location, or socioeconomic circumstance.

Executive Order On Advancing Racial Equity and Support for Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government

JANUARY 20, 2021 . PRESIDENTIAL ACTIONS

The head of each agency, or designee, shall conduct such review and within 200 days of the date of this order provide a report to the Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy (APDP) reflecting findings on the following:

- (a) Potential barriers that underserved communities and individuals may face to enrollment in and access to benefits and services in Federal programs;
- (b) Potential barriers that underserved communities and individuals may face in taking advantage of agency procurement and contracting opportunities;
- (c) Whether new policies, regulations, or guidance documents may be necessary to advance equity in agency actions and programs; and
- (d) The operational status and level of institutional resources available to offices or divisions within the agency that are responsible for **advancing civil rights** or whose mandates specifically include **serving underrepresented or disadvantaged communities**.
